
A basis for a European Research & Innovation (R&I) Partnership on Forests and Forestry All future European Partnerships under Horizon Europe have to develop a Strategic Research and Innovation Agenda (SRIA) or a Roadmap before their launch in order to ensure that the long-term vision is translated into concrete roadmaps with smart and measurable objectives ¹.

How is a SRIA developed?




- involvement of relevant key stakeholders representing all four dimenstions of the quadruple helix
- iterative process
- co-creation understood as a "collaborative process of creating new value together with external experts and stakeholders3"
- several formats of co-creation are applied:
 - Regional stakeholder workshops
 - European stakeholder workshops
 - thematic working groups
 - SRIA writing group
- Additional consultation formats planned
 - Surveys

Timeline Stakeholder Engagement






Regional Workshops: 1st Round



- ❖ Between 06-09/2023
- 6 parallel co-creation workshops following the same methodology
- to kick-off SRIA development: focus SCOPE and Initial collection of R&I topics
- To involve all EU countries (according to regional distribution) + associated countries
- Representatives of the <u>entire</u> quadruple helix for each country
- Approx. 40 participants per workshop
- 1 day workshop
- 4 main topics



Chapter A: Forest Ecology



Relevance:

Two crises: Climate Change and Decrease of Biodiversity

- Decreasing biodiversity reduces the functional diversity of forest ecosystems
- Ability to respond to the stressors
- Existing as well as new emerging pests, pathogens and other invasive species are spreading to new ecosystems
- Ecological resilience of forest ecosystems to these increasingly frequent stresses is therefore of major importance
- Forests provide many ecosystem services, including carbon sequestration, and thus contributing to climate change mitigation.

<u>Challenges:</u>

- Adapting forest ecosystems to tolerate greater and more variable climate change impacts while conserving forest biodiversity and other ecosystem services
- New approaches to forest restoration that maximise biodiversity and ecosystem services
- Monitoring of biodiversity and its functional components, from molecular level to landscape
- Decreasing our response time to pests and pathogens to achieve effective control of epidemics

Chapter B: Forest Management



Challenges

- Tackling environmental polycrisis that includes simultaneously e.g. more frequently occurring extreme weather events and resulting natural disasters, water availability and negative development of forest biodiversity
- Worrying development trends in the growth rates and health of forests
- Securing sustainable and long-term wood sourcing and provision of other forest-based materials for European bioeconomy
- Institutional frictions to change the prevailing management practices in different European regions
- Largely varying forest management traditions, administrative structures and environmental conditions

Our objective is to provide science-based justifications and solutions for the diversification of forest management in European forests resulting in more multi-functional and economically viable forest structures for the future.

Chapter C: Forest Products



Relevance:

- 43 % of Europe's land covered by forest masses.
- Growing source of natural resources for bio-based industries:
- Reduce dependence on critical raw materials in Europe
- Promote local development
- Greening of industrial ecosystems (EU Industrial Strategy)
- Replacement of fossil materials in different sectors.

Challenges:

- Higher deployment of wood products in established fields and new territories.
- Promotion of newly introduced wood species and underused ones.
- Enhancement of circularity, durability, resilience and sustainability of forest products.
- Analysis of market dynamics and new value chains.
- Establishment of proper regulation aspects at the whole value chain
- Fully digitalization of the production process
- Skills development and social awareness of the wood products benefits.

Chapter D: Social Aspects & Policy



Challenges:

- Urbanization, globalization, and digitalization impact societal demands, production technologies, and market processes
- The climate and biodiversity crises
- The growing complexity of societal interactions and processes
- Conflicts between various forest uses and policies
- Limited capacity and resources; etc.

Objectives:

- Emerging societal demands
- Forests as renewable resource
- Role in human health and well-being
- Technological advancements
- Growing consumer awareness of sustainability
- Increasing tools and recognition for cross-sectoral perspectives
- Systemic views on research and innovation, etc.

SRIA development – first draft




- presentation of SRIA draft to interested stakeholders on 16 May 2024
- more than 150 stakeholders from all four stakeholder branches participated
- intensive online consultation to collect further insights and comments
- adaptation of first SRIA draft until August 2024
- collection of R&I themes suggested to be addressed by the Partnership - finalised

European Workshop: 2nd round



- ❖ aim is to develop an intervention logic / interventional framework in which the R&I themes could be addressed within the Partnership
 - → SRIA Roadmap
- four dimensions of intervention discussed
 - ❖ General prioritization of R&I themes
 - Level of implementation (EU/national, regional)
 - ❖ Adequate funding activities according to TRL
 - ❖ Time frame
- ❖ a survey was set up to pre-structure the R&I themes from the SRIA
- SRIA Roadmap as orientation framework for the Partnership
