
Manifesto: a written statement of the beliefs, aims, and policies of an organization, especially a political party [Cambridge dictionary]

Under the lead of DG Research and Innovation, co-signed by DG Agriculture and Rural Development, DG Environment, DG Maritime Affairs, and DG Industry and Entrepreneurship.







- Concrete actions to be initiated in 2017 with active participation and ownership by panel members and well beyond












1. INPUT > BUILING BLOCKS

Dutch presidency 2016:

- Series of interviews with stakeholders
- Two stakeholder workshops in Brussels in February and March 2016
- Email consultation with questions about agrees and disagrees on a broad range of topics with the broader stakeholder community
- Discussions and break-out groups discussing content of building blocks document at BEU April 2016 Utrecht
- Recirculation of document to conference attendies after Utrecht to collect and process further input
- Handling over the resulting document to the Bioeconomy Stakeholder Panel at their meeting on 17 June 2016



2. BUILDING BLOCKS > MANIFESTO

Bioeconomy Panel June 2016 – June 2017:

- 'exploratory' break-out session in meeting June 2016
- Panel discussion on approach towards finalisation in meeting September; recirculation and collection of input
- Two- step approach. 1: work on structure and outline, 2: revising the texts.
- Collecting feedback and input at and in between panel meetings. Time allowed to consult constituencies.

GOOD

- Assembly of an editorial team
- Manifesto editorial team meets in between panel meetings. Pushes forward process
- Final inputs at/after meeting 30 March.
- Manifesto up for adoption in meeting in July.
- Lay-out and printing
